Milwaukee --

The 10th Annual Badger Open ended with a three way tie for first place between William Williams, John Geder, and James Ellis (tiebreak order) all with 5-1. Sixty players competed September 2-4. Sioux Falls participants Mark Sokolowski and Algis Jonaitis finished with 4½ and 4 respectively.

Bismarck --

Gary Wallace, Reuben Bezpaletz, and George Boos traveled to the Bismarck Open September 16-17. Gary went 4-1, tied for first place.

Isanti and Burnsville --

Steve Haataja, now a student in Minneapolis, has been taking advantage of the numerous tournaments in the area. On September 23, Steve was 2-1 at the Kingsmen Quads. On September 30, he scored an undefeated 3-1 at the Viking Open, including a win over an 1800 player and draws with two 1700's.

Fargo --

The 14th North Dakota Open, October 6-8, was won by James VanBuskirk of Minnesota. He had five wins and one draw. Twelve of the eighty-eight players were from South Dakota. Of the twelve, Dave Kerkhove at 4½-1½ and Jerry Mortimer at 4-2 had the best scores. Jim Madson finished with 3½ after shocking Minnesota Master Curt Brasket in the first round. The score of that game is on page 4. Gerald Fauske went 3-3 against six higher rated opponents. The other South Dakota players were John Bauer, Dan Jolivet, Jerry Bergan, Bob Borgers, Mark Rensch, Bob Chase, Arnold Mathews, and Paul Loegering.

The President's Column by David Kerkhove

Here I am, fresh from a triumphant journey to Fargo, North Dakota. I led the South Dakota contingent with 4½ points even though I played Class F chess. Someone who did play well was Jerry Fauske, who continued his recently begun rise in South Dakota chess.

The World Championship Match has ended with Karpov winning over Korchnoi as I predicted. Korchnoi had rallied from 5-2 to tie at 5-5 before Karpov won the final game. The Swiss Chess Federation will file an appeal, proposing a four game playoff, because the Russian parapsychologist, who was not supposed to be present, was sitting in the fourth row during the final game. However, Karpov is still the World Champion.

The Women's Championship also ended with six wins versus five, but the challenger, Maia Chiburdanidze, won this one over the defender, Nona Gaprindashvili. The final score was 8½-7½.

Robert Borgers, Jim Madson, and John Kittelson have enrolled in an endgames class taught by yours truly. This is a part of the Talented Student Project at Washington High School in Sioux Falls and will continue through the 78-79 academic year. I expect this to improve their endgame play one rating class. I hope some of you readers will organize similar classes in some phase of the game of chess.

In upcoming events, we have the Sioux Falls Championship starting soon, and Jerry Mortimer's \$1750 Sioux Falls Open April 7-8. The latter will be a Category 1 tournament with 8 Grand Prix points for first place.

National and International News

Bobby Fischer says he plans to come out of retirement. Arrangements are being made for a match with Yugoslav Grandmaster Svetozar Gligoric next March. Fischer expects \$1,000,000 for playing. Even a later match with Karpov is possible. However, Fischer says he will never again play in any event administered by FIDE.

In 1968, Scottish International Master David Levy offered to bet that there would not be a computer program within ten years that could beat him at chess. Eventually the bet grew to £1250 between Levy and four computer scientists. Levy turned back challenges from Northwestern University's CHESS 4.5, the Russian KAISSA, and the MIT Greenblatt machine by winning the first game in each of the three two game series. Now Levy has collected on the wager after defeating a final challenge by CHESS 4.7. The match was played in Toronto August 26 - September 4; the score, $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$. Here are the games in which the computer scored.
