Lincoln --

Mike Mathews of Lincoln became the new state champion of Nebraska by winning the Midwest Open with $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ on tiebreaks over Bob Holliman of Crete. Thirty-four players competed, but no masters or experts this time.

Winona --

The \$1620 Winona (Minnesota) Winterkill drew 54 players October 21-22. Walter Morris, the only master entered, won with a clean 5-0. Fletcher Baragar took clear second at $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$. Other players that we have seen in South Dakota were Yakov Dubrovsky, 4-1, Jon Dummermuth, 4-1, Mitchell Weiss, and Paul Shannon.

Sioux Falls --

Dave Kerkhove has won the Augustana Extra, a six-man round robin run in conjunction with the Fifth Annual Augustana College Championships, which are still in progress. The crosstable is on page 4.

Fargo --

A total of 42 players participated in the Bison Class Championships November 24-26. Because of the distribution of entries, the tournament was run in four divisions rather than pure classes. The B and better division saw a tie between Stephan Popel and Steve Eik at 6-1. To gain the tie, Eik had to defeat Popel in the last round. It was his first tournament win over the professor after numerous tries. The C/D division was won by Mark Hanson of Fargo with $6\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$. Hanson is a high school student with a rapidly rising rating now in the 1400's. Second place went to Gene Goergen, 5-2, of Centerville, South Dakota. Other South Dakota players were Rod Kuchta of Sioux Falls and John Canu of Yankton.

Some of the big chess news is from Buenos Aires, where the Chess Olympics just finished. Hungary was first, USSR second, USA third. Victor Korchnoi, playing for Switzerland, killed the USA's chance in the last round as he defeated Lubosh Kavalek, thus giving the Russians second place. The fine young English team was led by Anthony Miles on first board. Miles defeated Boris Spassky when England played the Soviet Union. It was Spassky's first loss in seven Olympics, a streak that covered 86 games!

The new FIDE president is Fredrick Olafsson of Iceland. He narrowly defeated Svetozar Gligorich of Yugoslavia to repalce outgoing President Max Euwe.

According to Chess Life and Review, Emil Knapp did very well in the membership building contest, finishing 19th in the country.

National and International News

The International Chess Federation has awarded the title of International Grandmaster to Kenneth Rogoff, 25, of the United States. The award was announced at the recent FIDE Congress in Buenos Aires. Rogoff's three grandmaster norm performances were second place in the 1976 U. S. Championship and Zonal, a first place tie at the Orense (Spain) International also in 1976, and a strong showing at Lone Pine earlier this year. Rogoff is pursuing a Ph. D. in economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. (USCF news release)

Second place: Soviet Union (36): Boris Spassky, Tigran Petrosian, Lev Polugaevsky, Boris Gulko, Oleg Romanishin, Rafael Vaganian.

Third place: United States (35): Lubomir Kavalek (7-4), Walter Browne (4½-4½), Anatoly Lein (6-4), Robert Byrne (4-4), James Tarjan (9½-1½), William Lombardy (4-3).

Fourth place: West Germany (33). Victor Korchnoi had seven wins, four draws, and no losses for Switzerland. To his disappointment, Switzerland was never paired with the Soviet Union.

Book Review

Karpov vs. Korchnoi, World Chess Championship 1978.

By Bent Larsen. Introduction by Michael Stean. David McKay Company, Inc., New York, 1978. 143 pages. \$3.95(P).

The Karpov-Korchnoi match ended on October 18. Would you believe a publication date of October 20? As Larsen says, "There will be many books on this match, but this was to be the first one. The book went to press before Korchnoi's resignation was officially announced!"

About two-thirds of the book is devoted to the games of the match, annotated by Grandmaster Larsen sometimes lightly, sometimes more thoroughly, always with interesting sidelights. Besides the games, the book contains the game-by-game scores of all world championships beginning with Steinitz-Zuckertort in 1886, all previous games between Karpov and Korchnoi (two of them with notes by Korchnoi), and background material on the men and the setting by Stean. Interspersed in the text are clever caricatures of the champions.

Players of all strengths should find this an interesting, worthwhile book.

3 Nf3 Nc6 4 d4 e4 5 Ng5 Qe7. An equalizing line is 5 ... h6 6 Nge5 Ne5 7 Ne5 Qh4 8 Nc3 Qd4. 6 ... d5 Na5. The losing move. Kaninchen wanted to play 6 ... Ne5 but feared losing a pawn. He did not notice 7 ... Nc4.

7 Nb5 Kd8 8 d6 cd 9 Nd6. The knight is immune to capture because of the fork at f7. At this point Black has no good move. Seeing that his king is going to be forced forward, he attempts to make a space to flee to.

9 ... a6 10 Ngf7+ Kc7 11 Bf4 Qe6. To avoid 12 Nf5+ 12 Nb5+ Kb6. If Black plays his king to e6, White has Nd8+ after which White can gobble the queen or transpose into the mate below.

13 Bc7+ Kc5 14 Qd4+ Kb4 15 Qc3+ Kc5 16 b4+ Kc6 17 Nd8++, 1-0. Match score: 3½-3½.
