Jack Bier and Steve Norquist tied for 2nd and left with \$50 each. The Reserve section had a 3 way tie for 1st with VanDeest, Herr, and Gary Mitchell of Nebraska winning \$30 each.

Upsets included Danny VanDeest and Pat Steele's wins over Curtis Carroll in rounds 1 and 2. Pat Steele's perpetual check of Louis Horton and Larry Patterson's win over Arnie Mathews. Gary Mitchell drew Jeff Barth and beat Bryant Holmes.

The event had some down notes. Randy Bauer's car was hit and he had to take a bye round 3 to secure a rental vehicle. Eric Hosen withdrew due to a family emergency. Louis Horton was absent during the 3rd round and missed the TD's warning of impending daylight savings time. When he arrived at 10:30 am CDT, all that one could do was inform him of his time forfeit. Danny VanDeest had a Sunday morning "rendezvous" arrived at his board 45 minutes late and won his game.

All in all the tournament was a success. See you there next year.

I present my most enjoyable game from the Sioux Falls Open with my hasty notes of what was going on in my mind at the time. I make no claim to anything like definitive analysis.

April 7, 1991

1. d4 N-f6
2. c4 g6
3. N-c3

As usual, I am at this point in the process of selecting my opening on the basis of, as much as anything else, the sort of mood I'm in at the time. As reference to the crosstable will verify, this had been a difficult tournament for me to this point. I had played a Grunfeld against Danny Van Deest in Round 1, and lost after emerging from the Opening up a pawn. I mulled this over a minute or two and decided that an immediate contest for the center was in order.

4. c5 d5

Sometime, in some long ago otherwise forgotten game, in one of my rare 1. d4 openings, I played this early c5 myself. My result was not favorable, in part because of this move. I was not unhappy that Mr. Herr played it, but I did not know exactly how to respond. Black is committed to the kingside fianchetto, so why not move, let white make the next further committing move, and try to do some thinking on white's time?

5. N-f3 B-g7

Not much commitment there. Black's c6 is solid, protects the d5 pawn, covers b5, and only prevents black's N-c6 which doesn't seem like a very good idea anyway.

6. e3 c6
- Nb-d7

This is solid too, but I'm happy. White's development is slow, and Black can easily get his game going.

Preparing a break on e5. Perhaps immediately castling is slightly better, but the difference seems insignificant. The only drawback is that it blocks the queen bishop which seldom wants premature involvement at any rate in this type of game.

7. B-e2 O-O
8. O-O R-e8

White's c5 and e3 moves enhance the attractiveness of supporting the e5 break with the rook.

9. b4

White makes his queenside intentions known. Whether the specifics of his plan are to exchange on c6, leaving black with an awkwardness to protect, or to simply claim huge

amounts of space and otherwise to cramp and tie black up on the queenside. But before white can bring any such plan to fruition, black is ready in the center now.

10. b5? e5

Now just a second. Doesn't this move hang something? It seemed so to me at the time. It still seems so; and I did win a pawn. The analysis, however, makes my head swim, and I do not pretend to know for certain.

11. B-b2 exd4 N-e4
12. exd4 Ndxc5

White's surprisingly vulnerable pawn on c5 and his weaknesses on the long diagonal appear to have caught up with him. At this point I am fairly sure that Black wins at least a pawn in all variations, although not the strongest pawn.

13. bxc6 Nxc3
14. Bxc3 bxc6
15. R-cl N-e4
16. B-al

Black is indeed up a pawn. Ain't it a beauty? The immediate opportunity to trade it for White's d pawn was too much to pass up, even though black's extra pawn will be isolated, and need much effort and care to defend, at least it will be a passer.

In retrospect, B-e6 would probably have been better. I also considered a5, Q-g5 and N-e4.

20. Bxa6 Nxa6
21. Q-d2!

This is a good move. It prepares to build up on the d pawn, and also to go to h6, a move which, while probably premature, will remain a troublesome threat for several moves.

N-c7

White's immediate Q-h6 can be met with R-e4 and either R-h4 or Q-f8. Black's immediate R-e4, however, could be easily countered, and would seem to only help white's attack. The immediate need is to overprotect the d pawn to allow flexibility for black's pieces. White has demonstrated the awkwardness of black's pieces.

22. Rf-d1

This move both threatens to control queenside space, and prepares a possible R-a3, and to h3, f3 or d3. The position is volatile enough that for that next several moves I would not be surprised if either side has a surprise forced win hiding in the bushes somewhere.

White's R-h4 at this point would be difficult to meet, but I remember that I did consider it, and I thought that I could meet it, just how I'm not sure.

Black initiates the plan to bring about the exact position that emerges after black's 33rd move, a position that should be won for black with best play. White's cooperation, however, is not always forced, and I was most pleased after the next six moves when no nasty surprises turned up and I found myself with what should have been a won endgame.

Whew.

(Necessary to avoid tempo checks.)

I had felt it necessary to calculate all this back at move 27. Amazingly it had all gone precisely according to plan. If my mind was clear enough to calculate all that, then surely I was struggling back into form. Oh, that I had been able to play so well the first two rounds I was thinking. I was beginning to feel confident again, and, as frequently happens, pride goeth before a fall.

Here I got to thinking again, and I thought about how simple it would be to win a king and pawn endgame if the remaining pieces were off. I thought I could pretty much force it. This time my analysis envisioned the position after black's 39th, but then came an unpleasant surprise.

Ouch! Now black has only a small advantage and no win without further help from white. White cooperates enough to make it an interesting endgame. Black may have missed another win somewhere along the way. But I have not found one.

White has cooperated somewhat by advancing his pawns before bringing his knight back into optimal position. Now black launches various plans which come amazingly close. It is possible that black missed a win somewhere.

White still can't take the knight. N-elch here comes very close. The white king gets no closer to the h pawn. Unfortunately the black king can't get any closer either, and neither the h pawn nor the black's knight can move until it does.

Two pawns up, I had real hopes of winning. However from here on white defends extremely accurately as far as I can tell.

If the black king is to participate it has to come around the f pawn on the wide side of the board even though this allows white time to place his pieces to maximum effect.

Further progress demands sacrifice of the h pawn. Where white can then sacrifice his knight for the f pawn at any time it might seem that the game is over, still black still comes up with threats that require careful play to counter.

ABERDONIAN WINE STATE CHESS TITLE

Larry Patterson of Aberdeen Central brought the state chess crown back to Aberdeen by upsetting two-time Champion Kyle Hammond of Martin, S. D. Larry, a 400 point underdog, won a piece in the middle game and kept the pressure on throughout. Kyle failed to make his 30th move within the allotted time and forfeited on time. This gave Larry first place and Kyle second place in the Grades 10 - 12 category.

The tournament, a five round event, was sponsored by the Northern State University Intramural Department at Aberdeen. It was held Saturday, April 20th at the Student Union Building on campus.

Bill Falconer and Troy Syre, both Northern State University students tied for first place in the college division.

An excited and enthusiastic group of eight students from Whittier Junior High in Sioux Falls won the team trophy by producing the highest team score of any school. Whittier's Kirby Kozel and Mike Gregory also tied for first place in the Grades 9 and under category. Their teacher and mentor, Jean Talley Tlustos, said that even though they had to rise early in order to leave Sioux Falls by 5:00 A.M. it was all worthwhile and they are planning to be back again.

The event, formerly held in Pierre each year, has been held in Aberdeen the last two years and is scheduled again for next year.

In addition to the first place trophy the winner was awarded a Northern State University scholarship.

BOOK REVIEW

PETROSIAN'S LEGACY by Tigran Petrosian, published by Erebound Editions inc.

This book which just came out is a collection of lectures and articles by the late World Champion. Tigran gives his view of his match with Robert Fischer where he felt out maneuvered by the American who got his way on every condition. Chapters include studies of "The Positional Exchange Sacrifice" where a rook is given for a minor piece to improve one's position and and "The Problem of Uncomfortable Opponent" where one is faced with an opponent who you don't like and who "radiates a perfect knowledge" of every opening line you dig up.

I was able for the most part to read this book without sight of a board using the frequent diagrams. The language seems a little stiff and I did find a couple of misspelled words though I found no errors in game scores. Any serious student of the Game will find this an interesting addition to their library. The chapter on the Fischer Match adds insight from a historical point of view.

Tigran Petrosian was a great player who was overshadowed by Fischer following on so soon. His positional and defensive innovations have left their mark.
